# **Key Findings**

This report provides a summary of responses to key questions from the first National Uniform & Equipment Survey for Staffordshire Police<sup>1</sup>. National results and additional information are available in the main report **here**.

## **Respondents and Response Rate**

- 160 responses were recorded from Staffordshire Police, representing a response rate<sup>2</sup> of approximately 4% (based on March 2024 total police force headcount)<sup>3</sup>.
- 68% of respondents are police officers, and 32% are police staff.
- 29% of respondents identified as female, 51% as male, and 20% did not specify their sex.

# **Overall Uniform Experience**

- 60% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said their experience of wearing uniform is 'negative' or 'extremely negative', slightly higher than the 56% average across the 43 forces in England and Wales.
- 19% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said that their experience is 'positive', while 21% stated they have a 'neutral' experience.
- 41% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said their uniform items interact together 'poorly' or 'very poorly', while 19% said their uniform items interact 'well'.

 27% reported that their uniform items do not interact well together with Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), compared to 22% who said that their uniform items and PPE interact 'well'.

## **Uniform Functionality and Fit**

- Nearly half (49%) of respondents from Staffordshire Police do not believe that their uniform is fit for purpose.
- 55% of respondents from Staffordshire Police agreed that their uniform restricts their movement.
- 55% of respondents from Staffordshire Police disagreed that their uniform is good quality, while 60% of respondents from this force said that their uniform does not fit well.
- 40% of respondents from Staffordshire Police disagreed that their uniform is durable, while 37% agreed.
- 57% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said their uniform is uncomfortable,
   while 23% said they are comfortable in their uniform.
- 74% of respondents from Staffordshire Police disagreed that their uniform keeps them cool in summer, while only 6% agreed.
- 44% of respondents from Staffordshire Police disagreed that their uniform keeps them warm in winter, and 55% of respondents disagreed that their uniform is waterproof.

#### **Uniform Items**

66% of respondents from Staffordshire Police reported wearing cargo trousers.
 Of these respondents, 78% said this item contributes negatively to their experience of wearing uniform, higher than the national average of 69%.

- 77% of respondents who wear general purpose trousers from Staffordshire Police said this item contributes to a negative uniform experience, while 54% of those who wear combat trousers said the same.
- 60% of respondents who wear general purpose body armour (GPBA) said it contributes to a negative uniform experience, while all of the respondents who wear ballistic body armour said the same.
- 59% of respondents who wear a bowler hat from Staffordshire Police said this item contributes to a negative experience wearing uniform.

#### **Uniform Access and Stores**

- Only 13% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said that obtaining new uniform items is 'easy' or 'extremely easy', while the majority (62%) of respondents said it is 'difficult' or 'extremely difficult'.
- 69% of respondents from Staffordshire Police reported that they have visited their local uniform store.
- The remaining respondents indicated the following reasons for not visiting a store: 9% did not know it was an option, 6% said it is not an option to visit, and 9% said they are not allowed to visit.
- Among those who had visited a store, 30% reported that items were not available
  in their size, and 32% said some but not all items were available in their size.
- Most respondents from Staffordshire Police received the items they ordered within weeks (44%), 27% received items within three months, and 13% received items within days.

#### **Uniform Cost**

 78% of respondents from Staffordshire Police agreed that cost drives uniform decisions, while only 6% disagreed.

## **Perception of Uniform**

- 55% of respondents from Staffordshire Police feel professional in their uniform, slightly higher than the average across England and Wales of 51%. However, more than one in five (22%) said they do not feel professional in their uniform.
- 45% of respondents from Staffordshire Police feel they look smart in their uniform, while 32% feel they do not look smart.
- 54% of respondents from Staffordshire Police feel proud in their uniform, while
   22% said they do not feel proud in their uniform.

# **Uniform and Health and Wellbeing**

- 52% of respondents from Staffordshire Police reported at least one health condition they believe was caused or made worse by their uniform, highlighting clear concerns about the physical impact of uniform wear.
- Among those who provided their sex, 83% of female respondents from Staffordshire Police reported at least one health condition they believe is caused or made worse by their uniform, compared to 52% of male respondents from this force.
- 34% of respondents from Staffordshire Police agreed that their uniform affects their relationship with their body.
- 9% respondents from Staffordshire Police agreed that their uniform affects their mental wellbeing, while 16% said their emotional wellbeing has been effected.

# **Complaints and Sick Leave**

- 41% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said they had made a uniformrelated complaint.
- For 70% of these complaints, no action was taken.

- 2% of respondents from Staffordshire Police have taken time off work due to the negative effects of uniform, lower than the national average of 5%.
- 47% of respondents from Staffordshire Police said that although they had experienced negative effects due to wearing their uniform, they did not take sick leave.
- Reasons for not taking sick leave at Staffordshire Police included previous negative experiences disclosing uniform-related issues (6%), worries that taking sick leave would negatively affect work opportunities (4%), negative attitudes in the force (4%), and a perceived lack of empathy from line managers (4%).

## **Uniform Impact on Retention and Role Choices**

 14% of respondents from Staffordshire Police have made decisions about their current or future roles based on the uniform they must wear. This includes transitioning to a non-uniformed role, choosing a role based on the required uniform, and even leaving the force due to uniform-related issues.

# **Thoughts on National Uniform**

53% of respondents from Staffordshire Police agreed that there should be a national uniform across England and Wales, while 19% disagreed, and 28% feel neutral.

Figure 1: Proportion of respondents who said that their experience of uniform is 'negative' or 'extremely negative'.




Figure 2: Proportion of respondents who disagreed or strongly disagreed that their uniform is fit for purpose.




Figure 3: Proportion of respondents who reported one or more physical health conditions they believe to have been caused or made worse by their uniform.




Figure 4: Proportion of uniform-related complaints where no action was taken.
